

A 6-Chromatic Unit Distance Graph in Space

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The chromatic number of the n -dimensional Euclidean space is the minimum number of colors with which the entire space can be colored so that every two points one unit apart have different colors. A unit-distance graph in n dimensions is a graph whose vertices are points in the n -dimensional space and whose edges are pairs of points unit-distance apart. Clearly, the chromatic number of an n -dimensional space is at least as large as the chromatic number of some finite unit-distance graph. The chromatic number is greater than or equal to $n+1$, since every two vertices of an n -dimensional regular simplex of unit side-length require different colors. The spindle construction, ascribed to Moser and Moser for $n = 2$ and Raikii for $n > 3$, uses regular simplices to demonstrate that the chromatic number is greater than or equal to $n + 2$. In 2002, Nechushtan proved that the chromatic number in 3 dimensions is greater than or equal to 6 and claimed that his proof can be used to construct a unit-distance graph which requires six colors and has no more than 400 vertices. By rotating and transforming Nechushtan's basic unit-distance graph with chromatic number 5, we construct an explicit unit-distance graph in 3 dimensions with chromatic number 6 that has only 79 vertices and 250 edges. Our methods can be applied to certain 2-deficient, x -chromatic unit-distance graphs in order to construct graphs with chromatic number $x+1$.
